

Student Transfer Report

Fall 2018- Fall 2022 Analysis

FCC regularly collects data from the National Student Clearinghouse on students who have transferred to higher education institutions nationwide. Examination across semesters for the period of fall 2018 through fall 2022 showed that 7,154 students transferred to either a Maryland (approximately 62%) or an out-of-state institution (approximately 38%). Specifically, 55% (n = 3,943) transferred to Maryland four-year institutions, 7% (n = 507) transferred to Maryland two-year institutions, 36% (n =2,555) transferred to out-ofstate four-year institutions, and approximately 2% (n =149) transferred to out-of-state two-year institutions (see Figure 1). Approximately, 91% of FCC's transfer students moved on to a four-year educational institution.




Transfers to Maryland Institutions: Approximately 62% (n= 4,450) of FCC's students transferred to Maryland institutions during this period. The following table shows the number of students who transferred to two and four-year institutions (See Table 1). University of MD College Park, Towson University, University of MD Global Campus (UMUC), Hood College, Frostburg State University, University of Maryland Baltimore County attracted the most FCC transfer students.


Transfers to Out-of-State Institutions: Approximately 36% (N= 2,555) of students transferred to out-of-state institutions (see F2). During this period, the top ten states to which these students transferred were Pennsylvania (19%, N=524), Virginia (14%, N=378),

West Virginia (11%, N=285), North Carolina (7%, N=192), Florida (6%, N=162), South Carolina (5%, N=142), New York (4%, N=103), District of Columbia (3%, N=84), Ohio (3%, N=70), and Massachusetts (2%, N=59).




Other transfer destinations made up approximately 25% of Out-of -State Transfer Destinations (n=2,621).


Transfer Trend by Semester: F3& T2 show FCC's transfer trends by semester from fall 2018 to fall 2022. FCC students tend to transfer and enroll in Maryland institutions during the fall semesters. Out-of-State transfers decrease during the spring. In fall semesters, an average of 1,215 FCC students transferred to new institutions. During the spring, an average of 270 FCC students transferred.

<u>**Gender</u>:** There were 4,318 (60%) female and 2,835 (40%) male students who transferred to Maryland and out-of-state institutions from fall 2018 to fall 2022. The rate of transfer and enrollment at FCC by gender is similar. Among females, 63% (n = 2,724) transferred to Maryland institutions and 37% (n = 1,594) transferred to out-of-state institutions. Among males, 61% (n = 1,726) transferred to Maryland institutions and 39% (n = 1,109) transferred to out-of-state institutions (see F4).</u>



**Note: Decimals were not rounded up for this figure to help compare FCC Race/Ethnicity percentage.

<u>Race/Ethnicity</u>: Examination of transfer students by ethnicity showed that most were Caucasian (67%, n = 4,808) followed by African Americans (14%, n = 973), Hispanics (10%, n = 735), Asians (8%, n = 586), Native Americans (0.4%, n = 27), Other/Not Specified (0.1%, n = 9), and Hawaiian/Pacific Islander (0.2%, n=16). White students make up a greater percentage of transfer students than they do in overall FCC enrollment.

Transfer to Institutions based on Race/Ethnicity: F6 shows the percentage of each ethnic group that transferred to Maryland or Out-of-State Institutions from fall 2018 to fall 2022. The data shows that for each ethnic group, a consistently larger percent of students transferred to MD institutions than to out-of-state institutions. However, the proportion of out-of-state transfer students seems to fluctuate overtime especially for minority groups with small group size.
